It is my honour and privilege to present this report as part of a team of trustees that worked together to achieve some wonderful events where Apakura descendants could come together to celebrate, commemorate, and reclaim our cultural spaces. I would like to highlight some of the significant events that occurred this year.

### Historic Gathering at Saint Paul's Rangiaowhia

One of the most poignant events was the gathering of members of the Anglican Church Te Haahi Mihingare and Ngaati Apakura at the historic Saint Paul's Rangiaowhia. This gathering was a significant moment to acknowledge their original association in the midnineteenth century and to reflect on the events of February 21, 1864, when Anglican Bishop George Augustus Selwyn was unable to protect Ngaati Apakura non-combatants.

In a profound gesture of restorative justice, Te Hui Amorangi ki te Manawa o te Wheke and the Anglican Diocese of Waikato and Taranaki formally transferred the title deed of 4.7 hectares at 61 Rangiaowhia Road to the Ngaati Apakura Runanga Trust. This land transfer symbolizes a step towards hohou te rongoa- reconciliation of healing and recognition of our historical ties.

### **Cultural and Agricultural Initiatives**

Our cultural and agricultural initiatives have also seen great success. We have been able to grow and harvest kumara on our whenua, symbolizing a return to traditional practices and self-sufficiency. The first harvested vegetables were gifted to Kingi Pootatu te tua whitu at Poohara marae, highlighting the value of whenua being able to provide for the people.

### 2023 AGM and Election of New Trustees

The Annual General Meeting (AGM) of 2023 was another significant event where we elected eight new trustees. This election is a critical step in ensuring our leadership remains strong and representative of our Iwi, hapu, and whaanau needs and aspirations.

### **Opportunities for Growth**

These events are more than just celebrations; they are opportunities for trustees to utilize in growing Apakura aspirations. The transfer of land, the cultural initiatives, and the election of new trustees all contribute to a stronger, more cohesive community.

With your continued support, we can achieve even greater heights together. Your participation and dedication are vital to our collective success and the realization of our shared vision for the future.


### Apakura Runanga Trust 2023 Financial Summary

# Highlights

### Jobs 4 Nature

The Jobs for Nature programme supports communities by creating nature-based employment and stimulating the economy post-COVID-19. The Department of Conservation (DOC) funds project partners to generate jobs on private and public conservation land, focusing on predator and weed control, wetland restoration, regenerative planting, and enhancing tracks, huts, and other recreational assets. The programme prioritizes the involvement of iwi, hapū, and whānau.

### Key Activities and Funding Allocation

The programme involves:

- Predator control
- Wetland restoration
- Regenerative planting
- Improving tracks, huts, and recreational assets

### Year 2 of the project

The Apakura Ruunanga project, part of the Maungatautari to Pirongia Ecological Corridor, to create an ecological corridor along the Mangapiko Stream and its tributaries though biodiversity plantings, and animal and weed pest control. This work will enhance habitat for native species, transform iwi connections to the awa, and ultimately improve water quality.

When the project was started in December 2021, the then-chair Bill Harris also saw the potential for this project to build relationships and to create a performance record for ART that could be leveraged for future aspirations.

The project receives \$250,000 from Department of Conservation and additionally leverages support from Waikato Regional Council, Waipā District Council, Pūkireki Marae, and from Fonterra. The project is a little sister to Taiea te Taiao, working in the same area, running alongside for a shorter time with a smaller budget.

### The commitment over the entire project

Between 1/1/22 and 31/12/24, ART J4N will deliver the following outcomes:

- 25 ha possum control
- 25 ha rat & mustelid control
- 3,000m new fencing
- 10ha riparian ecosystem planting (consider related pest control)
- 25,000 riparian trees planted
- 1 historic/cultural asset maintained (Mātakitaki Pā)

As at 31<sup>st</sup> December 2023, the project had achieved 37 ha of possum, rat and mustelid control, 1,513m of new fencing, 3.81 ha of new planting and 10,276 trees have been planted. In addition, about 600 trees were potted up at the Matariki celebration at Kihikihi Domain in 2023, and a total of 9,700 plants have been grown on for the 2024 winter planting season.

The project has faced some challenges including a very wet first winter, and erosion at Mātakitaki but these have been worked through and we are now on track to meet the contractual commitments by project end on 31<sup>st</sup> December 2024. We are hoping to have a celebration of some sort in November, so watch this space





### AGM election of new Trustees

The Annual General Meeting (AGM) on 28 April 2023 provided a platform for the Iwi or shareholders to receive comprehensive updates on the organisation's performance over the past year. During the AGM, attendees reviewed financial statements, discussed key achievements and challenges, and outlined future plans. Member votes played a crucial role

in making significant decisions, such as the election of board members or key officers. This forum also allowed members to address any questions or concerns, ensuring transparency and accountability in the organisation's governance.

During this period, Apakura Runanga Trust, supported by members of Te Waha a Tuara, voted to endorse a new Trust Deed. This endorsement paved the way for the formation of a new Entity, tasked with negotiating the Rangiaowhia Reconciliation Package with the Crown agency, Te Arawhiti. Fresh elections were conducted, with 11 nominations received and 7 candidates elected as trustees, alongside 1 kaumaatua representative. The election process required substantial preparatory work, including updates to the tribal register, development of voting software, creation of candidate profiles, and communication efforts directed towards the Iwi. Congratulations are extended to all the successful trustees.



# Waikato Regional Authority application to help purchase 161 Banks Road Property, Wairoto

The project aims to reconnect Ngaati Apakura and Ngaati Hinetu with Wairoto and enable mana whenua to lead the restoration of the lake. The lake system, known as Ngaaroto or Wairoto to the iwi, is severely degraded. Restoring the health and well-being of Wairoto

begins with mana whenua restoring their physical, cultural, and spiritual connection with the lake.

Funding from the Waikato River Authority (WRA) would enable Apakura Rūnanga Trust to purchase and retire wetland at 164 Bank Road, located at the southern inflow end of the lake. This acquisition will complement the Waipā District Council-owned land, creating a contiguous and extensive protected area. Retiring this land from farming is the first step in the longer-term restoration of the wetland system. This initiative will improve access, education, and opportunities to build skills and capacity.

By establishing a base at the lake, the Apakura Ruunanga Trust will be well-positioned to collaborate with partners in the Waipā Peat Lakes & Wetlands Accord on holistic, long-term ecological and cultural restoration projects.

This project will be supported under a co-funded arrangement with Waipa District Council, Department of Conservation and Fonterra. We are very pleased to advise that the application to Waikato Regional Council was successful and \$400,000 has been allocated to this project. We will work with our partners to try and get this project across the line.







### 160 years Hauhake celebration

The hauhake celebration of harvesting kumara event highlights the significant cultural and agricultural restoration efforts in Rangiaowhia, a location with historical importance for its flourishing orchards and fields before the Paahuatanga on February 21, 1864. The initiative, spearheaded by the descendants of the survivors, and supported by Te ahi Tapara Ltd director and whaanau Lorinda Pereira and John Pereira began back in Dec 2022 and previous Chair Bill Harris in the planting of Kumara tupu. The aim was to revive the traditional horticulture

and agriculture practices, including the planting of kūmara, peruperu, and peach heritage seedlings. This restoration not only honors the past but also seeks to sustain the land's productivity and cultural heritage for future generations.


### Oceans Before Me- First Single release

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### Rangiaowhia Reconciliation Package

Discussions are continuing with Te Arawhiti on a reconciliation package whereby the Crown will acknowledge the wrong committed through its paahuatanga at Rangiaowhia. It is wonderful to advise that we have received confirmed support from both Waikato-Tainui and Maniapoto. No significant discussion has yet been held about the scope of any reconciliation package, but it will be focused on reconciliation in relation to the events at Rangiaowhia and will not be a settlement of historical Tiriti o Waitangi/Treaty of Waitangi claims. It is separate from, and will not undermine, any settlements. Instead, this initiative acknowledges the pāhuatanga at Rangiaowhia and the impacts of Crown actions, and seeks to provide appropriate reconciliation to help heal the relationship between the Crown and iwi. Te Arawhiti wants to work with iwi to develop a process which includes Crown reconciliation with all groups affected by the pāhuatanga. We see the following five stages as key to determining the reconciliation process:

1. research into the events at Rangiaowhia and who was involved;

- 2. engagement with groups who were affected to determine whether they wish to be part of the reconciliation and how;
- 3. development of an agreed process to develop a package;
- 4. discussions around the contents of the package; and
- 5. final agreement and implementation.

We have completed the first two of these stages. In 2020-2021, we commissioned Dr Robert Joseph to assess who was present at Rangiaowhia at the time of the Crown attack and to assess how they were affected. The report was finalised this year. The research also summarised which groups were directly affected by the aftermath of the attack. A copy of the report is enclosed. In 2021, Ngāti Apakura called a series of hui to connect with groups whom we knew had been affected. Our understanding from that engagement is that those groups contacted broadly support the development of a package to be led by Ngāti Apakura, with involvement from other groups. In December a letter was developed and sent out to those other identified Iwi who were impacted from the paahuatanga and we look forward to hearing from there response. We have begun work on step 3 development of an agreed process to develop a package. Moving forward this has been an exciting space and look forward to continue with the challenges on the development of a package and a strong team will need to be assembled to help us navigate this space.

### Reconciling the whenua at 61 Rangiaowhia Road 4 September 2023

On the fourth of September, members of the Anglican Church Te Haahi Mihingare and Ngaati Apakura, gathered in historic Saint Paul's Rangiaowhia to acknowledge he return of a piece of land at Rangiaowhia to Ngaati Apakura and Ngaati Hinetu. It has been met with profound joy and optimism for the future for the Iwi as this occasion was marked by tears of joyful reconnection rather than painful separation, highlighting the emotional significance of this event for the Iwi.

The Anglican Church, in collaboration with Ngati Hinetu and Ngati Apakura, had been striving to secure the land adjacent to St Paul's Church. Despite being outbid at auction, a fortuitous opportunity arose when the successful bidder agreed to on-sell the land, leading to a successful acquisition. Archbishop Philip Richardson of the Anglican Church described the outcome as a positive step forward, though he emphasized that it is just the beginning of a longer journey. He acknowledged the ongoing need for discussions between the church and mana whenua regarding the history of Rangiaowhia.

This landmark event marked the land's return with a gathering at 61 Rangiaowhia Road, where they celebrated with a shared meal and discussed future plans. This moment, filled with emotional and cultural significance is a step closer in the right direction towards reconciliation healing and a hopeful future for the Iwi, hapu and whanaau whaanui.
